

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Introduction

You are invited to join all Catholic schools in the Province as we celebrate Catholic Schools Week. Our Theme this year is: CSW 2022 **One Family, One Hope in Christ**

Consider beginning each day with a liturgy/prayer as a whole school or individual classroom activity where you can celebrate as a community.

Liturgical Cycle

All Catholic schools in British Columbia begin Catholic Schools Week the first full week of February. Island Catholic Schools begin CSW celebrations on Sunday, February 6 and continue for the remainder of the week. Scriptural readings, following the Church year, are taken from:

- † **Year C** ~ Sunday Lectionary Cycle
- † **Series II** ~ Weekday Lectionary Cycle

CSW Sunday*

Schools are encouraged to begin the week celebrating Sunday liturgy with the local parish. To the extent possible, staff and student should be well prepared and involved as:

- ministers of hospitality
- altar servers
- choir members
- lectors (or readers)
- person(s) who prepares the altar
- gift presenters

If possible, a reception at the school hosted by the students and staff follows this celebration.

*In 2022 in person gatherings may still be restricted – if your parish offers a live stream Mass option consider arranging a special announcement before or after the livestream offering. Another option is to prepare a short CSW video to email to all parishioners.

Daily Prayers for Catholic Schools' Week

Prayer services within this booklet may be used by individual classrooms, all-school assemblies, or a combination of both. Many classrooms are using Children's Daily Prayer LTP, feel free to use the readings of the day from that text

Each prayer in that text is developed in the following manner:

- Opening Prayer
- Reading of the Day
- A Short Period of Reflection (Silent or verbal)
- Prayer of the Faithful (Universal Prayer)
- Communal Recitation of the Our Father
- Closing Prayer

Music for the Gospel acclamation or a psalm response, remains optional, but is a wonderful addition you might wish to include.

Breaking Open the Theme

PART A: PRACTICAL SUGGESTIONS FOR DEVELOPING STUDENT LECTORS

This is a compilation of tips that may be utilized when preparing student Lectors for a school or classroom celebration. Work with students to help them understand that...

- proclaiming to a crowd through a microphone is much different than conversational speech. It takes some time - albeit only seconds - for the sound to emanate from the Lector's diaphragm, through the vocal cords, out the mouth, be relayed through the sound system, be heard and ultimately comprehended by the listener. Therefore, one must learn to make effective use of one's breathing and speaking, and to speak with a different cadence and pitch.
- there are some practices that can be used with both children and adults alike to help calm any anxious nerves a Lector has. When practiced, they can also help to establish a receptive atmosphere for the spoken word on the part of the assembly, provide for an appropriate and relaxed tone by the Lector, and promote the recognition that what is being celebrated is indeed important.
- although it is a person *reading* the words (and persons do get nervous!), Catholics believe that it is actually God who is *speaking* to those gathered, using the voice of the student. So, it is the Lector's responsibility to appear almost as invisible as possible in order that God's Word be heard.

Therefore, the lector must rehearse the reading beforehand

- using a *photocopy* of the reading only for practice at home.
- at school/church, use the actual book that will be used during the celebration.

Note: It is important that the Lector become familiar with how the story will look on the page so that they know what to expect should their eyes get lost. (It is alright for them to use their fingers to keep their place in the book - that is a practice many adults use.)

Help them study the story or passage (as appropriate), to the point of memorization, and question it. Who wrote it? Why did they write it? What was being said? What happened just before or after this part of the story? Should the story sound encouraging, or woeful – happy or sad? How does reading it make *you* feel? Do you better understand the story or passage? Consider how then it might make your audience feel.

Rehearse the procedure:

- Have the lector(s) practice *processing* from their seat, to the ambo, and then back to their seat. If the reader crosses in front of the altar, it is appropriate for the lector to stop and make a profound bow to the altar. No bow is necessary if the lector does not cross in front of the altar. Repeat as necessary.

- Remind the lector to plant his/her feet firmly on the floor behind the ambo and microphone.
- Take a slow, deep breath, and silently count to two.

Engage the Listener:

- to encourage eye contact with members of the assembly, have the Lector choose one or two spots on the wall just above the heads of the audience
- teach them to confidently and calmly announce the reading ("*A reading from the book of/ the letter of _____*"), then pause for a
 - silent count of three;
- pause for a silent count of two after each period or semi-colon;
- choose 2 or 3 spots on the wall to have the students look at during the Reading.



Exaggerate the words and tone reminding them to:

- let their voice dance over the words, filled with changes in pitch, expression and enthusiasm!
- pause for a silent count of three between finishing the reading, and concluding with "*The Word of the Lord*";
- remain in place, feet still firmly planted, for another silent count of two.
- only then slowly turn, and *Process* back to their seat.

In a word, remind your Lector to relax. The important thing about stories is they are meant to be told. He/she should simply think about telling us the story.

It is most important for those who proclaim the Word of God to remember that we always do this for the glory of God! We do our best and God is pleased. Mistakes happen and that is okay. 😊

PART B: BREAKING OPEN THE WORD (Lectio Divina)

Oral Response:

Divide a larger class into groups of 4 – 5 students.

Opening Prayer:

+ We praise you loving God for your Word, Jesus Christ. Give us your Holy Spirit to listen to your Word with our ears, to treasure it in our hearts, and live it with our lives. We ask this through Christ our Lord. (Yr 4, Come and See Student Book, CCCB. P 18, 19)

Read the Gospel. As you read the Gospel slowly and deliberately, invite the groups to listen for a word or phrase that stands out to you, that speaks to you.

Reflect in Silence at least 60 seconds!

Individual Response:

Invite each group member to say the word or phrase out loud individually, without offering any judgment, discussion or comment (although you, as leader, may choose to write each comment on chart paper).

Read the Gospel a second time:

Read the Gospel a second time, slowly and deliberately.

Reflect in Silence:

What do I hear in my heart?

Where does this passage and today's homily touch my life today?

Small Group Response:

In small groups (of 4-5 persons) share your own experiences, using "I" statements:

I am ..., I feel ..., I think ...

Read the Gospel a third time:

Read the Gospel a third time; slowly and deliberately.

Reflect In Silence:

From what I have heard and shared, what does God want me to be or do this week? How does God invite me to change? Be concrete and specific.

(Or, alternatively, what do I take home with me this week?)

Small Group Response:

In small groups (of 4-5 persons) share your own experiences of the reading using "I" statements:

I am ...,

I feel,

I think

Sending:

Gather the large group together again. Review group wisdom, then close with a summary prayer (such as this).

+ Through the gift of your Spirit loving God, the early followers of Jesus proclaimed the joy of the Goods News. Give us the same joy and help us to share it with all people. We ask this through Christ our Lord. +

(Yr 4, Come and See Student Book, CCCB. P 18, 19)

Options:

You might want to:

read the 1st or 2nd reading;

explore spontaneous petition prayer, shared prayer or summary prayer.

Breaking Open the Word - Written Response

Opening Prayer:

The purpose of this prayer time is to gather and prayerfully focus. Use the following or similar words.

+ O God, giver of all good gifts, you are the source of our life, our health our gifts. As we gather around your Word, make us attentive to your voice and alert to your presence. We ask this through Christ our Lord. (Year 5, May We be One Student Book, CCCB p 14, 15)

Read the Gospel:

Read the Gospel slowly.

Reflect: What Did You Hear?

Write three thoughts, ideas, phrases, images that “spoke to you” from today’s readings and homilies.

Read the Gospel a Second Time:

Read the Gospel a second time slowly and deliberately.

Reflect: What Does It Mean?

What do you think these words or phrases spoke to you today? What might they mean for your life? Can you recall a time – past or present – when you experienced something similar to the event expressed in today’s reading(s)? How did these readings and homily enlighten or challenge that feeling? Write three questions that today’s readings and homily raise for your daily life, your faith, your church. Use “I” statements (I am ..., I feel ..., I think)

What Does It Cost You to Live This Message?

- List one concrete way you feel called to live this message this week.
- What will help you to live and achieve this?
- What might be some pertinent obstacles?

Sharing the Message:

Divide the group into smaller groups of 4-5 people. Invite them to share their reflections with one another.

Sending:

Gather the large group together again. Close with a summary prayer.

+ God of justice, rock of salvation, open our minds and hearts to Jesus your Son. Let us hold fast to his words and express them in deeds, that our faith be built on a sure foundation and that our lives may be made worthy of you. We ask this through Christ our Lord. +
(Year 5, May We be One Student Book, CCCB p 14, 15)

Options:

You might want to:

- read the 1st reading, the 2nd reading
- explore creating something new (poem, story, painting, song, etc.)

Breaking Open the Word - Scriptural Improv Response

Purpose:

To let the creativity of the participants, flow through the engagement with a Scripture passage.

Timeframe: 30 – 45 minutes

Supplies: Bibles Preparation:

Choose a passage. (This may be chosen on the Lectionary reading, a theme, or even chosen by the group). The group ideally should be 3-5 persons. Each group could have a separate passage, or interpret the same passage.

Opening Prayer:

Begin with a group prayer, asking for God's Wisdom in words such as these:

+ We praise you loving God for your Word, Jesus Christ. Give us your Holy Spirit to listen to your Word with our ears, to treasure it in our hearts, and live it with our lives. We ask this through Christ our Lord. (Yr 4, Come and See Student Book, CCCB. P 18, 19)

Read:

Read (or have someone else read) the passage only once, with gusto and enthusiasm! Talk about what stands out from hearing this passage this first time, just once.

Ask "What do you think God was trying to say to those gathered at the time it was first told (or written, or recorded)?"

Re-Read:

Read the passage a second time, again with gusto and enthusiasm.

Ask "What do you think God is trying to say to us, today, in this text?"

Plan:

Plan an improvisational skit to attempt to communicate to those gathered what God is speaking about in this text. As a group, discuss the point(s) you want to get across, the characters needed in the sketch, and most importantly, how you will end the sketch.

Action!

Let it go – you, the teacher need not script a thing!

If presented to a larger group, read the passage again. Very briefly, set the stage and provide the context for your improv.

A discussion may follow the improv, allowing the following questions to be raised:

What stood out in the sketch?

- Did you feel the discomfort of certain characters?
- Where do you find yourself in this sketch?
- How might you feel had you been/if you find yourself in that situation (again)?

Sending:

Lastly, bring things to a close with a brief summation, and close with an impromptu prayer led by yourself or a student.

No one has ever seen God; but if we love one another, God lives in us and his love is made complete in us.

Liturgy for Children; For Our Families

Introduction

Our family life is one of the most important and significant areas of our lives. It can bring great happiness or unhappiness to us and this Liturgy is a time to pray for our families. We're thankful for the care and love we get in our families. At times, we don't always experience that peace and harmony, so we also pray for those families who are having difficulties.

We learn a lot about life in our families: the first people we love and quarrel with are in the family. We learn how to get along with others, how to deal with frustrations, how to give-and-take in day-to-day life.

No family is completely happy; each has its problems. But the family is our beginning, our rock, our security. We move away from it as we get older, but the family is a place to which we can come back for love and support.

Jesus grew up in a family with Mary and Joseph and had an extended family of cousins, aunts, and uncles, who played a large role in his life. In this Liturgy let us pray for our parents and siblings, that each of us will contribute to the happiness of our own family life.

Opening prayer

God our Father, creator of all who live, you sent your Son among us to gather us together as brothers and sisters. He grew up in a family with Mary and Joseph, and so we ask his help in our family life. Help us to make our school community a family of families. Help us to grow closer each day, centered in your Love.

May we know contentment, peace, and happiness in our school and in our homes. We ask this through Christ our Lord. Amen

He knew, too, the sorrow of death when Joseph died, and that his parents experienced hardship because of him, forced as they were out of their homeland when Jesus was born. They felt sorrow again when he was lost in Jerusalem, and Mary saw him suffering and dying on the cross. He left home, knowing his mission in life, and Mary, the mother who loved him, had to learn to let him go. She had to learn to be his mother in a new way, and then in so doing, she became our mother, too. The Word became one of us, fully one of us, the son of family; the son of God shared our family life. With the help of our Mother, Mary we can become a close school family. We can support one another and celebrate with one another. God wants us to be one family, one hope in Christ

Universal prayer

May family love, peace, and contentment grow in our homes and in our school, loving God and may we learn to understand each other's difficulties and strains. Give us the grace of forgiveness and tolerance for each other. We ask this through Christ our Lord, Amen.

Let us pray together the prayer that unites us all as one family in Christ:

Our Father...Amen

Let us share with one another a sign of God's peace, a sign of our one hope in Christ.

Closing prayer

As we go from this place, loving God, where we have celebrated the love of Jesus your Son, we ask you to bless us and all our family members. May we all may all we do and say the words and deeds that Jesus would see as his. Grant this through Christ our Lord.

Spice it up Prayers!

Alphabet Prayer- Challenge students to pray a prayer of thanks for things that each begin with a letter of the Alphabet.

Doodle Prayer- Direct the students to doodle on a piece of paper and then pray about what they see in the doodle.

Title Prayer- Ask the students to choose a title for God or for Jesus and then write a prayer related to that title.

Favourite Super Hero- Ask student to think of their favourite super hero and then share a little prayer on how it might symbolize God

Movement Prayers- do some stretching and balancing in the classroom or lineups giving thanks to God for each movement or part of the body being used.

Popcorn Thankfulness- In a spirit of gratefulness students simply give thanks for one thing in a rapid firing short time limit. i.e. 30 seconds.

Musical musings – Praying and listening to praise songs helps active youngsters still their minds and bodies and focus on Jesus. There are countless possibilities on Godtube and Youtube. Some favorites are: Awesome God, Lord I Lift Your Name on High, Like a Deer Pants for Water, Holy is His Name. Artists like Michael W Smith, Chris Tomlin, Amy Grant, John Michael Talbot are all some who can be powerful.

Prayers by flashlight – In a dark classroom, pray together and/or read the bible by flashlight

Silent Smiles and Good Wishes: Students remain silent with smiles on their faces looking at classmates and wishing in their mind good things for them.

Sharing the moment – “Share the moment” prayers help kids remember that Jesus is with them every minute of the day. Just before you experience something special and wonderful, take a moment to invite Jesus to share the experience with you. For example, at the top of the play slide or structure, you might pray, Be with us, Lord, and share this cool ride right along with us. We’re so grateful that You created this for us to enjoy! Say a little prayer before a game or quiz.

Sharing interests – Reassure your child that Jesus wants to hear about anything that’s on their mind. Simply invite them to pray by saying, God loves to hear about the things that you love. Would you like to talk to Him about trucks today? To get their ideas flowing, you might

first wish to read a book about your child's favourite subject, then tell Jesus some of the things you learned.

Egg timer prayers – This is a prayer with a challenge! Set an egg timer for a minute or two, then pray for one particular person. See how many different blessings you can pray over that person before the egg timer beeps.

Newspaper prayer – More suitable for older children, the newspaper prayer will help your students remember to pray for people in other regions of the world. Give selected students a section of the newspaper and a few minutes to go through it, identifying any items that could become matters of prayer. Then gather together and pray for the things each person has selected that need prayer

Social Media favourites – This is similar to the newspaper prayer. Have your older students check recent Social Media posts from friends and contacts. Pray together over the prayer requests you discover.

Prayer deck – Prepare a small stack of cards with each card displaying the photo or picture of something a student has brought in to pray for. Take turns praying for the people or things featured on the cards you receive.

Silent prayer – To introduce the concept of a “silent prayer,” deliberately interrupt your child several times during a conversation. Then explain that sometimes we can talk too much during prayer and interrupt Jesus when He is trying to tell us something. Add a time of waiting and listening at the end of a prayer of praise, or after praying through Scripture.

Prayer Walks - Take your class on a prayer walk. Encourage the students to be aware of God on the way. Invite them to be sensitive to what they see and hear and to consider what God is saying to them through it. (E.g. Bus stop – prayer for safe travels, playground – for friendships, staff room – for teachers, forested area -for animals, etc.)
